By day a team leader and developer of medical devices for applications including diabetes management, phlebotomy and drug delivery, David also curates the Spoken Word Series of the DeBaun Center for the Performing Arts at Stevens Institute of Technology in Hoboken, NJ.

Her poems have been published in several anthologies, including *Poetry Daily: 366 Poems from the World's Most Popular Poetry Website* and *Garrison Keillor's Good Poems for Hard Times*. Her poems have also appeared in such journals as *Harvard Review*, *Spoon River Poetry Review*, and *Prairie Schooner*, and have been featured on *Poetry Daily*, *Verse Daily*, and *The Writer's Almanac*. She is a past recipient of a Poetry Fellowship from the New Jersey State Council on the Arts and has received awards from *North American Review*, *Louisiana Literature*, the Newburyport Art Association, and the St. Louis Poetry Center. A former high school English teacher, Diane now works as a poet-in-the-schools.
